TDXpeditionS '84 (by KZ5M) My work is really starting to interfere with my hobby, but a few choice words are necessary to thank the Phone weekend "movers".

We had a ball on phone! For a club normally not known for doing it with the lips, the troops really showed the world our talent depth in this mode of communication. The big battle amongst the phone ops at XE2FU was for "Big Mouth" status. To keep things hot and the tension high, a top ten sheet was kept of hourly rates.

Chuck, K5LZO took Top Lip with a 293 per hour rate opening hour on 15. He had 100 of them in the first 17 minutes. He had the first 200 in 30 minutes. Man, what a mouth! It made all the difference in the world on Friday night and was a help on Saturday. Their 1,807 QSO's was a pleasant surprise for me. Between naps, Phil, K5RVK, and the only thing older than the fossils found on site, Frank, W5JWM, both did many thankless hours on 75 for us. Its a dirty job...but somebody had to do it.

Our resident yankee, Bill, K2TuNanOse, resurrected an old idea involving coax tuned to a specific frequency to use as a signal sucker. The beauties he built exhibited a suck out of about 30 db and were a big help for us phone weekend,

particularly on 20 and 40. Bill has a paper written about his work and has made it available to the TDXS.

Speaking of 40 and Bill...What a nice match up that turned out to be! A flaky guy in a flaky band producing the expected anarchy. With a 2,526/57, one would think it was all play and no work. Not so ol' Jalapeno Breath! Though we enjoyed the convenience of split frequency here, the mobs just didn't seem to gather. Don't get me wrong, a few 150+ hours were had to say nothing of Orville's 165 hour, but 40 Phone played a different tune than CW. Bill wouldn't let up though, and the numbers show it. He sat mother hen style nearly the whole 48 hours near by and kept the pressure on. Many a W spent a moment checking his rig to see if he could find a reason why that XE2 could run 'em by call areas at 1 p.m. and all the RX would produce was hiss. Matter of fact, they couldn't wait till Bill got to the 5's again so they could get in there in the pile and check their rig out! If it wasn't for the popcorn tearing the guts out of the VOX, 40 was a fun place to be.

Bob, W5SJS, not only served as 20M captain, he also supplied the RV, the beer and chow for the ops. Like Bill, Bob kept a real close eye on his area of responsibility constantly. 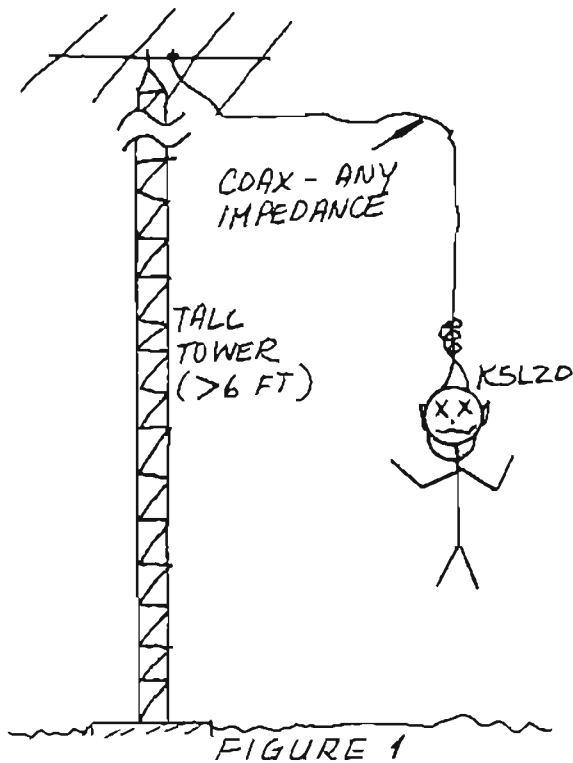
SU7 NIGER (by KC5M) Carl and Martha were not able to get a license. The local PTT was agreeable, but the current military government wasn't. Hopefully next time...

CONTEST REPORT (by K2TNO) Now that the XE2FU operation has subsided, it's time to check the high claimed scores in the Tuna Nose Grudge Match and Beer Fest Contest. THE FCC FIELD OPERATIONS BUREAU IN WASHINGTON D.C. HAS ISSUED A CORRECTION TO ITS FIELD OFFICE EXAMINATION SCHEDULE THAT WAS RELEASED LATE LAST YEAR. THERE WAS AN ERROR IN THE AUGUST DATES. THE CORRECT DATE FOR THE FCC ADMINISTERED EXAMS IS THE WEEK OF AUGUST 6 THROUGH 10. THE MAY AND NOVEMBER EXAMINATION SCHEDULE IS OTHERWISE ACCURATE AS PRINTED IN MARCH 1984 QST, PAGE 49 AND JANUARY 1984 QST, PAGE 59. AR

HR NR 13 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS
NEWINGTON, CT MARCH 7, 1984
TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT

THE ARRL FILED TWO REQUESTS FOR RULEMAKING CONCERNING 160 METERS ON FEBRUARY 2. THE FIRST ASKS THAT POWER RESTRICTIONS ON 1900 TO 2000 KHZ BE ELIMINATED. THE SECOND REQUESTS THAT THE COMMISSION ALLOW F1 EMISSIONS ON 1800 TO 2000 KHZ. DETAILS WILL BE IN QST HAPPENINGS FOR APRIL.

ON MARCH 5, THE FCC DESIGNATED THE F1 REQUEST AS RM 4774. THE THIRTY DAY COMMENT DEADLINE ENDS APRIL 4. NO RULEMAKING NUMBER HAS BEEN ASSIGNED TO THE ELIMINATION OF POWER RESTRICTIONS PETITION YET. AR

THE FCC HAS RELEASED A NOTICE OF PROPOSED RULEMAKING ON THE SUBJECT OF REIMBURSEMENT OF OUT OF POCKET COSTS INCURRED BY VOLUNTEER EXAMINERS AND VOLUNTEER EXAMINER COORDINATORS IN CONNECTION WITH THE PREPARATION, PROCESSING OR ADMINISTRATION OF AMATEUR RADIO EXAMINATIONS. FCC PROPOSED IN PR DOCKET 84 265 THAT VOLUNTEER EXAMINERS AND VOLUNTEER EXAMINER COORDINATORS MAY BE REIMBURSED FOR ACTUAL EXPENSES INCURRED, BUT TOTAL REIMBURSEMENT FOR AN EXAMINATION MAY NOT EXCEED FOUR DOLLARS. THE FOUR DOLLAR FIGURE MAY BE ADJUSTED ANUALLY FOR INFLATION. FCC DOES NOT SPECIFY HOW THE REIMBURSEMENT FEE IS TO BE DIVIDED BETWEEN THE VEC AND VE. COMMENTS ARE DUE BY APRIL 16, REPLY COMMENTS BY MAY 1. DETAILS WILL BE IN THE ARRL LETTER FOR MARCH 15 AND IN MAY QST. AR

AT THE REQUEST OF ARRL, THE FCC HAS LIFTED ALL POWER RESTRICTIONS IN THE 1900 TO 2000 KHZ BAND. A1 AND A3 EMISSIONS, WITH MAXIMUM PERMITTED PEP OUTPUT OF 1500 WATTS, ARE NOW PERMITTED IN ALL AREAS UNDER FCC JURISDICTION ON THE ENTIRE 1800 - 2000 KHZ band. THIS IS EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY. AR

CONSTITUTIONAL AMMENDMENTS

The following are descriptions of the three proposed constitutional ammendments addressed on the enclosed ballot (full members only)

ARTICLE XI Section 1

Now reads: Membership in the Texas DX Society is open to any amateur radio operator who: has demonstrated an interest in DX or contest activities, holds a valid amateur license, and is duly nominated and elected according to the procedures set forth in Article XII.

Proposed: Membership in the Texas DX Society is open to any radio amateur who meets the criteria of membership as stated on the Prospective Membership Form. This form can be amended once each year by a majority vote of the full members during a regular meeting.

ARTICLE XII Section 2

Now reads: The Board of Directors shall consider the eligibility and qualifications of the proposed member in closed session and notify the proposer through the club secretary of its decision.

Proposed: The Board of Directors shall consider the eligibility and qualifications of the proposed member, in accordance with Article XI Section 1, in closed session and notify the proposer through the club secretary of its decision.

ARTICLE XII Section 5

Now reads: A favorable vote of 75 % with at least 50% of the members voting shall be necessary for election.

Proposed: Any vote regarding a proposed member on a membership ballot which does not receive the required 50 % of the total qualified full member vote, either for or against, shall be considered null and void. The name shall be resubmitted for balloting at the next ballot opportunity if deemed necessary by the Board of Directors, Membership Committee, and Sponsor. A favorable vote shall be 75 % of the total vote for each proposed member with at least 50 % of the qualified full members voting.
