ZC4 All licenses issued by JSB were and are from within either of the two
SBA's or from within smaller areas administered by the SBA's. No
ZC4 callsign has been used from Cyprus & no Cypriot national has
used a ZC4 call other from within SBA administered territory. Under
these terms, all ZC4 calls should count for DXCC credit, providing
the ARRL accepts that the smaller areas outside the SBA's, but
administered by them, count as Sovereign Base Territory.
