CONTEST REPORT
(de KN5H)

The Fall 1986 Sprint Contests are history. From early figuring the club literally kicked butt. The CW team averaged 9000 pts. apiece for a score at 90K. The SSB

team did an equally outstanding job. The two contests are detailed later on.

The CQ WW DX CW Contest results appeared this month. Dave, K5GN did an outstanding job at YV5TK with a No. 6 Worldwide finish. The group that ventured to XE2 land had only one noteworthy item. KZ5M operated single band 40 for a No. 2 worldwide finish. KN5H, KG5U, N5AF and KB5FU were also heard on the bands but finished down in the scores. At the homefront, K5LZO finished No. 1 in the fifth district in the multi-multi category. W5ASP (multi-single) and crew were second in W5.

In the ARRL DX contests the club got hosed in Aggregate Score. We finished #10, with only 11 entries and 3.7 Meg. PVRC was #1, at 18.2 Meg. Those TDXS stations active did pretty well, such as:

THE SEPTEMBER 1986 CW SPRINT
(or how I spent a relaxing evening in front of the radio)
(de KN5H)

The CW Sprint has to be one of the highlights of radio contesting. No other event gets my adrenaline flowing like this contest. Unlike some other domestic contests, I honestly look forward to the Sprint.

Being a guest op has definite advantages and disadvantages. Its great to be able to sit right down and contest without the extensive preparations. The disadvantage lies in the unfamiliarity which one experiences with a new environment. Knowing the layout, strengths and potential of the station comes easy when its yours.

When Tom, N5EA extended the invite to come over for Sprint it took only milliseconds to reply. The idea of using an above average QTH was very appealing.

Upon my arrival I was greeted by a TH7DXX at 80 ft., a 2 ele. Cushcraft 40 mtr beam at 70 ft. and assorted slopers for 80. The shack showed off a TS 930 and Alpha 76, all primed and ready. After finding the head and the headphones, I was set. Tom informed me he would be going out for dinner and the place would be mine for a while. That was OK beacuse it would give me lots of time to get warmed up without embarrassing myself in front of him. I soon found out what 2 months of radio silence did to my fist.

After a short QSO with W1WEEF/M at 2345Z, my fingers were set. Wait a minute... That's the phone ringing. "Hello?? No, Tom's not here." The dreaded TVI complaint was hovering over me. Good, no message from the upset sounding caller.

More short QSO's with NE6I and KM9P. All Right! 20 is great! It's 2358Z and both coasts are there. The clock rolls over and the band is alive. KE3Q is number 1 and we are off. 11 Q's after 5 minutes, my best start ever. I work N6TR and I'm one up on him. This won't last long. K1ZX calls in. Now that's Jim, or Rambo or ... Spock! That helps to relieve some of the nervous tension. At 0028Z, QSO #40 goes out to VE2ZP, good mult. Now I'm getting into the swing of things. Uh Oh ... That's the phone again. No way I'm going to answer it. At 0039Z I find K5ZD. We are tied at 54 each. This is really great, holding my own with the big guys. More Q's with W6SZN, W6MKB, KG5U, W9RE, and VE7AHA. At 0050Z I have 70.

The rate starts to drop to one a minute and at 0105Z, Dave, K5GN sends me a sobering #96 compared to by #88. The phone rings again. Time to go to 40. No problems with the band change, less than 20 seconds. KOVBU goes in the log and we are off to the races again. NA4K goes in the log from Tenn., always a good one. At 0120Z there's K5LZO. I'm three ahead. Is there still a chance for the Top Ten? More Q's with K8MR, W8FN, AD8P, K8NZ, KW8N and N8ET. A big run of Ohio stations, all 40dB over! By 0200Z I have 152, still my best ever. The phone continues to ring and Tom finally comes home. There's Don, K0FX/7, Utah, thanks OM.

Things start to slow again and the dreaded 80 meter band change comes at 0237Z. Almost 1 1/2 hours to make a hundred Q's. Can I really do it? Conditions sound strange. A lot of watery signals from the East Coast but surprisingly not much QRN. Sure did expect that noise with all the bad WX around. KD8NS goes in the log as the first 80 meter Q. 17 Q's in 10 minutes on 80, could be a good sign.

The rate holds and 0300Z I give #228 to Tom, N4KG. Glad to see him again. More Q's with AI7B, K3LR, N5RZ, K1DG and W8LNO.

It's 0325Z, time for the sked. I know the way to win is to make a couple of skeds with the hard to get mults, right??? KB5FU/M should be down here at 3520 khz from that roadside park on the Miss/Ala State line. Nice, clear freq. but no mult. Maybe in a few. The west coast finally starts to come in but I can see the rate is going downhill fast. Can't ever get an answer to a CQ on this band. KBOQA from Iowa goes in the log with K6LL, N8ET, NR5M and N8EA right after him. Back down to 3520. Nothing. I've spent at least 10 minutes looking for Miss. At 0355Z I find KBOG, or is that KJOG or KEOG??? I can't remember which is which anymore. I have 2 minutes and it will be over. Another trip to 3520 and still no Miss. Can't find a new station so one more CQ with 40 seconds to go. Wait!! There's a weak one...WBOGOB. ALL RIGHT! Rodger came through. I have him #285 and in return, a great last minute mult. Thanks friend.

A check of the last 40 minutes reveals only 35 Q's. That's where I lost it, in the home stretch. Lots of chatter on the local 2 meter repeater. It looks like the club has a shot at the Number 1 spot. May 300 or the Top Ten next time, only time will tell.

CHRISTMAS ISLAND-----VK9XI is now active. This is an operation by ZL1AMO. Ron should be there through end-October. Try 7005-7005 KHZ from 1030-1230 UTC.

YEMEN-----Chances appear good for activity from 4W-land very soon. Two Americans working in Yemen are rumored to have equipment in route, with one possibly licensed already sources indicate that this will be a SSB operation only.

BOUVET ISLAND-----SP5EXA claims he has a good chance of going to 3Y this fall with operating permits. More details, soon.

MOUNT ATHOS-----More information circulating about the possibility of two monks obtaining their tickets for a permanent station on the Holy Rock. SVODK reports that the station could be used by visiting Greek hams. Seems the Greeks are tired of all the recent clandestine attempts and might help establish a legit op. No official word yet from ARRL on approving DL7FT/SV/A cards.

RODRIGUEZ ISLAND (3B9-)-----Plans are being finalized for a late October operation by 3B8DB. He is still waiting for the prime minister's blessing.

SINT MAARTEN (PJ7)-----K8UNP/PJ7 will be QRV September 27 thru October 4, CW and SSB, 160-10 meters. QSL to the home call.

JAN MAYEN ISLAND-----JX5AG was reported on 14021 at 1200 UTC. Also JX8KY working Europeans on 14169 at 1730 UTC.

FAEROE ISLANDS-----OY9JD was worked locally with good sigs on 14187 about 0000 UTC.

ALBANIA-----All the excitement over the Chzech operation this month is dead. Apparently VISAS were denied.

CHINA-----BY4RB, "HUA" was spotted on 14226 at 2340 UTC.

IRAQ-----YI1BGD is said to still be active Fridays on 14226 at 2100Z.

GALAPAGOS ISLANDS-----ED8G should be active from October 4-11. There may be some 30 meter operations. SSB FREQ'S: 1843, 3790, 7088, 14195, 21275, and 28500.

REUNION ISLAND-----FR42D, 40 meter CW starting 0230-0330Z. Check 7003-7005 KHZ.

SAUDI ARABIA-----HZ1HZ, reported on 14016 at 1800 UTC.

MONGOLIA-----JTODJT was worked on 14023 at 2300 UTC.

SRI LANKA-----4S7NMR, try 14215 around 1510 UTC.

MINAMI TORISHIMA-----Rick seems to be everywhere lately. On 160 meters,
listening 1830-1835, and transmitting 1911 KHZ. Best
times are 1230 UTC and 0730 UTC, Sunrise/Sunset.
Also: 3505 KHZ at 1300 UTC
7005 KHZ at 1200-1350 UTC.

PROPAGATION FORECAST
(de Chuck, KE5FI)

As I predicted last month, I belive June 1986 will prove to be the lowest month of solar activity marking the end of cycle 21 and the beginning of cycle 22. Last month I reviewed the sun spot numbers indicating this; this month I have studied the Flux values.

The average solar flux for June was 67.6. The lowest month at the end of cycle 20 was July, 1976 with 67.5 and cycle 19 ended with 67.0 in July 1964. Cycle 18 ended with two consecutive months below 68, June 1954 with 67.3 and July with 67.7. These listed months were the only ones below 68 from the beginning of recorded flux measurements in 1947 until today.

The annual mean for this year stands at about 72.9 at this point and may end the year lower.

September was an awful month for DX on the HF bands. There were several magnetic storms which effectively wiped out propagation paths anywhere close to the poles. The first storm occurred for about nine hours on September 2. Then there was a sudden storm commencement at 1837 UT on September 11 which pulsed between 2100 UT on the 11th and 1200 UT on the 12th. The K index reached 8 in Anchorage, Alaska and the Aurora could be seen as far south as Albuquerque, New Mexico, a VHFer's dream! That storm was finally over at 0600 UT on 14 September. Minor storms began again on 17th lasting until the 21st and on the 25th probably lasting until the 28th.

There are no spots visible on the Sun so some new activity will have to occur if the flux is to rise above 70 in October.

The magnetic field will probably be storming again on October 7-8 and 13-26. These are forecast to be bad periods. CQWW phone on October 25-26 will catch the end of these storms, but they should have subsided from the peaks earlier in the week. Low latitude and transequatorial paths should be the best for the contest and, of course, 20 meters and below. 15 and 10 should be open to the south during daylight hours.

SPRINT CW NUMBERS (de KSTU) The North American Sprint is the contesteer's contest, especially for dyed-in-the-wool CW ops like me. The QSY rule that requires you to keep moving the dial helps to equalize the big guns (we're talking BIG GUNS) and the modest home stations. The object of the contest is to make QSOs...as fast as you can...for four hours. Though multipliers are important, you will often get the mults if you make the Qs.

I though it would be interesting to look at the TDXS Team #1 CW scores for clues on how to improve. K5GN, KSLZD, NM5M and KN5H turn in consistently high scores from stations with a wide variety of antennas and equipment. Therefore, we can eliminate station equipment as a contributing factor. It must be technique.

Each team member provided me with a QSO breakdown by band for every 15 minute period of the contest (thanks, guys...). These results are shown in tabular format. From these tables you can see the number of QSOs by band, total QSOs at any point in the contest (TOTAL), NET number of QSOs for any 15 minute period, and the effective RATE of QSOs per hour for any given 15 minute period.

There are also two graphs. The first graphically combines the top 3 scores (based only on QSO total), while the second takes a look at the highest score, a middle score and the lowest score together.

As you would expect, the three highest scores track somewhat together save one 15 minute period where K5GN went multiplier hunting on 40M. All three stations had tremendous QSO rates in the first 30 minutes of the contest, and sustained high rates through the stretch on 40M.

The second graph reveals some key points. Note the slow start by Rich and me. Our rates were increasing during the first 45 minutes while Dave started high and decreased slightly. By the end of the first hour, I was 16 QSO's behind K5GN (87 vs. 71). Note also that both Rich and I failed to hold up our rates during the stretch on 40M and the beginning of the 80M run (0200Z-0330Z). Note that K5GN and NM5M actually increased their rates slightly during the same period, indicating that a strong finish seems to be important.

But let's sit back and look at the whole picture for a minute. Team #1 produced a first class score; perhaps a winning team score. The team competition is keen. Any modest improvement in score could give the TDXS the unequalled distinction of being the first true club team to win the North American CW Sprint.

I hope the numbers give you some insight into a way to improve your score. If you haven't tried it before, it is both the most challenging and rewarding contest I've operated. And remember, anyone on Team #2 who outscores a Team #1 member plays for the first team next Sprint. So sign up and give it a try in the Spring.

Dave, Hose, Eric, Chuck, Bob...better watch over your shoulder.

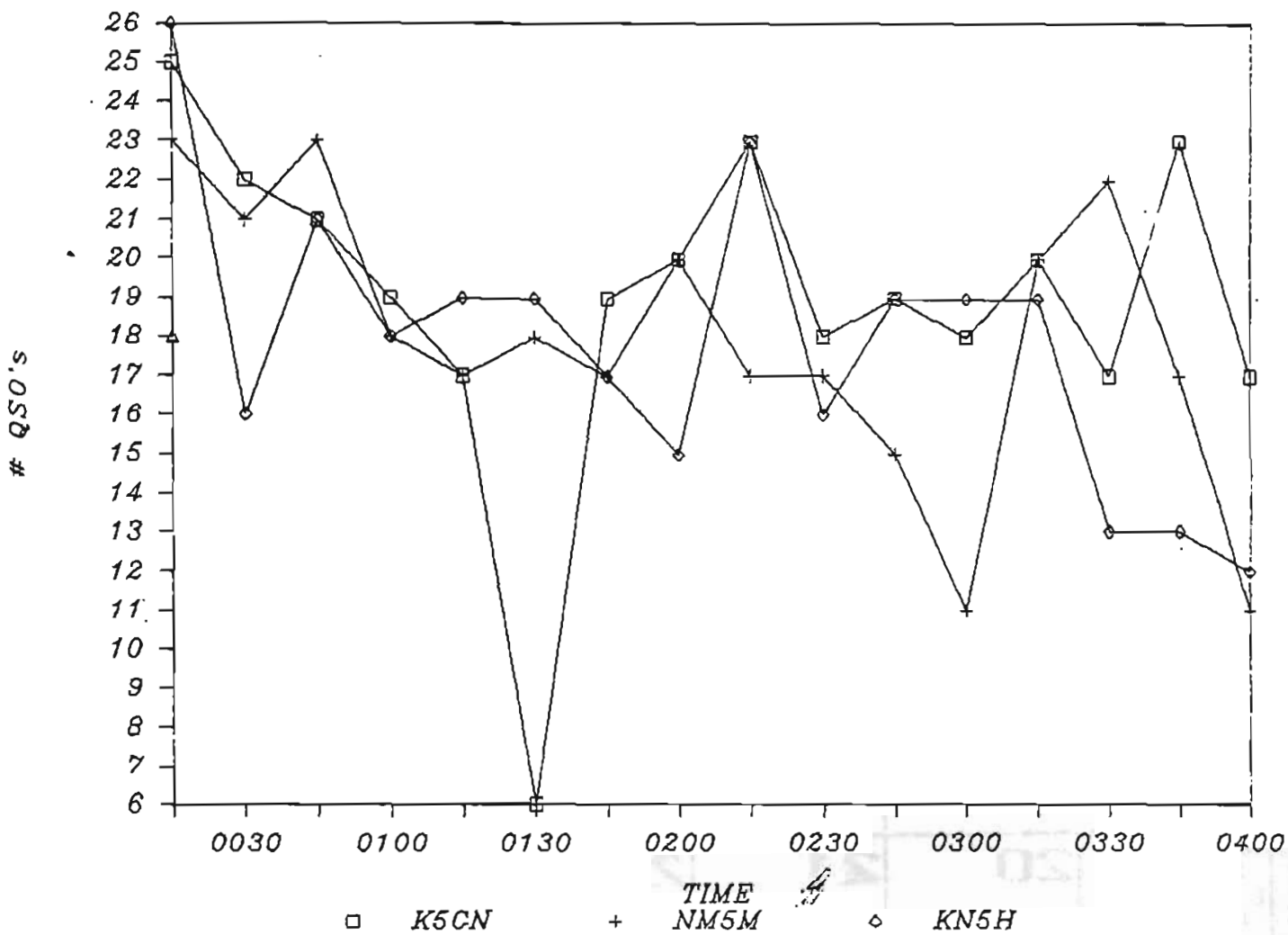

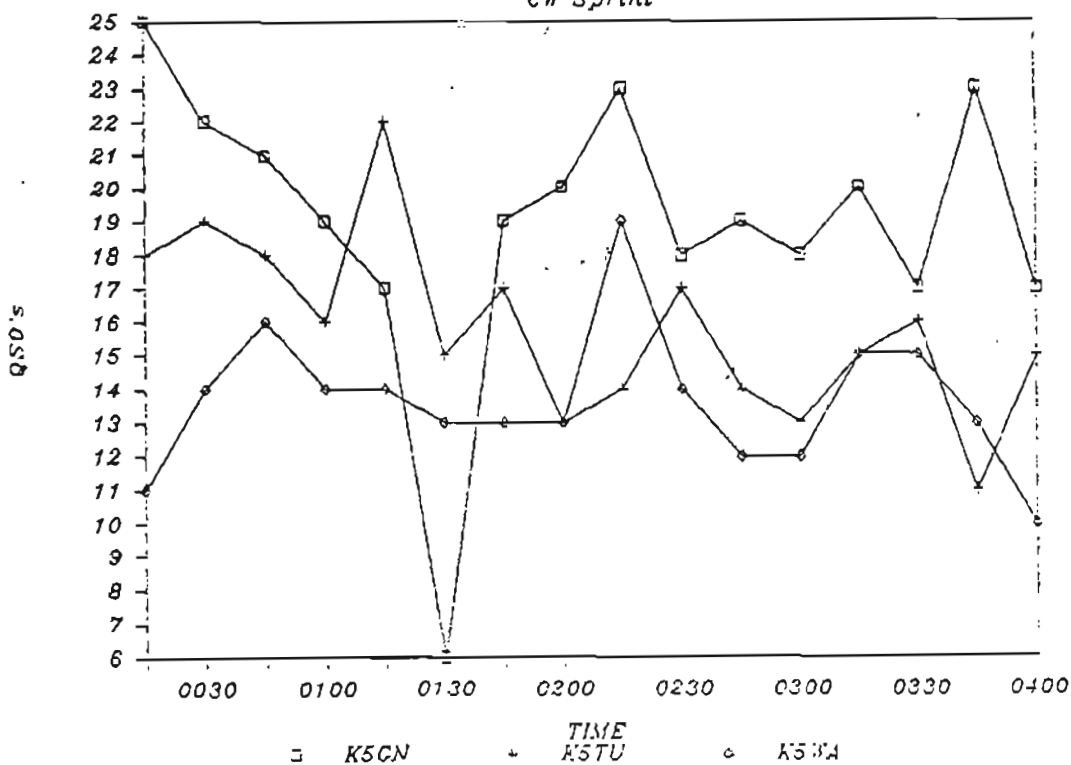

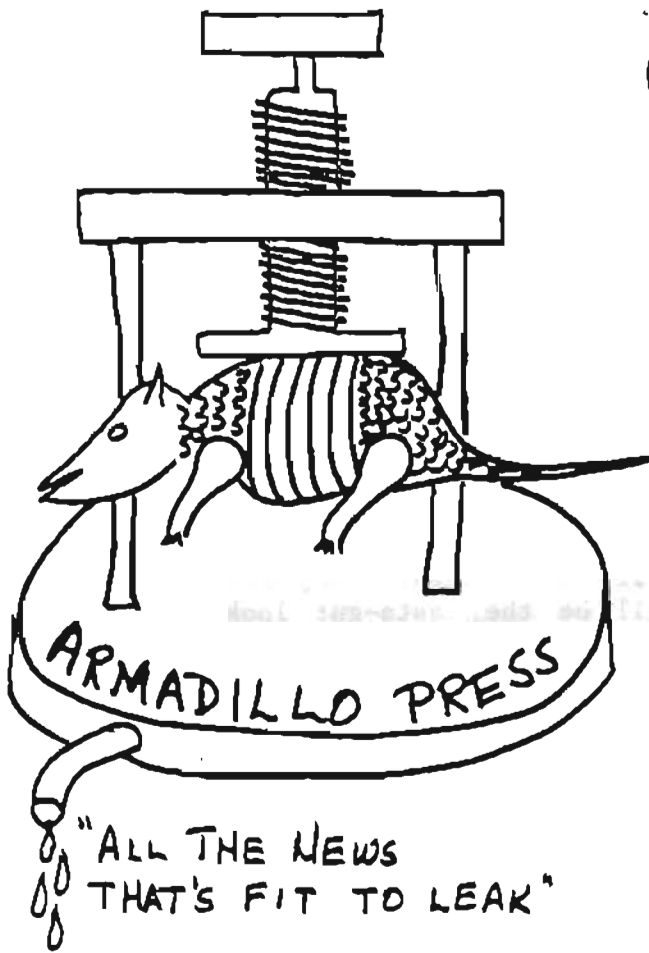
