CONTEST CLUBS (by AA6CV (ex W8LNO) - reprinted from the NCJ, September/October 1987) Contest clubs and contest-oriented DX clubs have long been those most recognizable to the masses as being responsible for activities affecting the DXCC country total or contest score of participating amateurs. Contesters provide the push necessary to get important DXpeditions off the ground and conducting programs and activities at major conventions, some of the thrust that makes our hobby more interesting.

The quality of the hobby and the health of contesting is perpetuated by contest-oriented clubs. Strong, geographically disbursed clubs increase the level of contest operating and competition and strengthen our voice. In the coming months, contest club activities and the people making them happen will be covered in this (NCJ-ed.) column. Also, ideas to strengthen clubs with emphasis on club competition and intraclub competitive programs.

Successful clubs have strong leaders and informal programs to identify and develop new leadership. They have excellent newsletters that provide communications with members and club identity. Entertaining meetings and activities, internal award pro-

grams, nets and repeaters, multioperator and expedition contest entries, and a strong belief in camaraderie round out the characteristics of successful and winning contest clubs.

The Contest Advisory Committee of the ARRL has recently given regional clubs a powerful shot in the arm by amending the meeting attendance rules to require attendance at only two meetings, regardless of the total number held. The new format will allow cells of activity which may resemble local clubs, but which will generate greater participation in club entries. Act now to be sure your club is organized in a way which will maximize your "medium" or "unlimited" class entry for ARRL competitions.

The changes are not the harbinger of the demise of the local club. Currently existing clubs will have renewed price in their exclusivity. New local clubs will result from the spin of factions within the membership of regional groups. These changes are likely to have a greater positive effect on contest clubs than anything since Murphy protested the 1971 Mad River Sweepstakes win.

Determining how clubs stack up in ARRL- and CQ-sponsored events is a mystery which often lingers even after the official results are published. Your (NCJ) columnist will be sending each newsletter editor or appropriate club person a request for reporting estimates of club scores and the class of entry, where applicable. It will be interesting to see what resemblance exists between high claimed and final club scores.

In undertaking this (NCJ) column, it seemed appropriate to list the events that would be indicative of its success:

- 1) The Society of Midwest Contesters not winning an ARRL SS gavel in the unlimited category.
- 2) The Texas DX Society not winning their chosen competition.
- 3) The Yankee Clipper Contest Club having a peer.
- 4) The Kansas City DX Club having a great newsletter without ABOX.

ABOUT OUR AILING REPEATER ... (de KSTU) Those of you who frequent the club's repeater know that it has had its share of technical trouble over the last 6 months. Hopefully, we've got it sorted out.

Eric, NM5M, changed jobs and transferred to granola land (that's California for you non-Texas boys), leaving the appointed office of Repeater Chairman vacant. Since that time, Wes, N5WW has offered to pitch in as temporary Repeater Chairman. Bill, K2TNO and I have also helped out.

The club operates a General Electric Mastr II repeater capable of running 110 watts output all day. It's located in the Greenway Plaza area, up about 475 feet. It's a beautiful piece of electronics, but then looks aren't everything. It has to work, too! Bill, K2TNO, and I designed the controller and interfaces for the identifier and 220 MHz control logic. Bill did a first class job of homebrewing the controller to fit into the repeater rack. The installation is equipped with battery back-up, and automatic switching should the AC power mains fail. When operating from battery power, the ID will change to "K5DX/R TDXS BAT". If you should hear this ID, please contact N5WW, K5TU or K2TNO immediately.

Unfortunately, the high power amplifier has had its troubles. The most recent failure wiped out some very expensive final transistors, probably because of a failure of the SWR shutdown circuit. (Ninth Corollary to Murphy's Law - The most expensive parts will fail in such a way to protect the least expensive parts.) For the last 2 weeks, the repeater has been running on only the exciter, with output power to the antenna of about 0.1 watts.

The amp is now repaired with a new set of transistors and some other parts that were vaporized when the transistors blew have been replaced. Hopefully, by the time you read this, the repeater will be back up at NR5M power levels (almost). For at least the first 90 days (the length of the warranty), the repeater will run full output of 110 W to make sure the amp is really "fixed". So, if you can hear it further than it hears you, you know why. After we're satisfied it is fixed, we'll return to the normal power level of around 50 W.

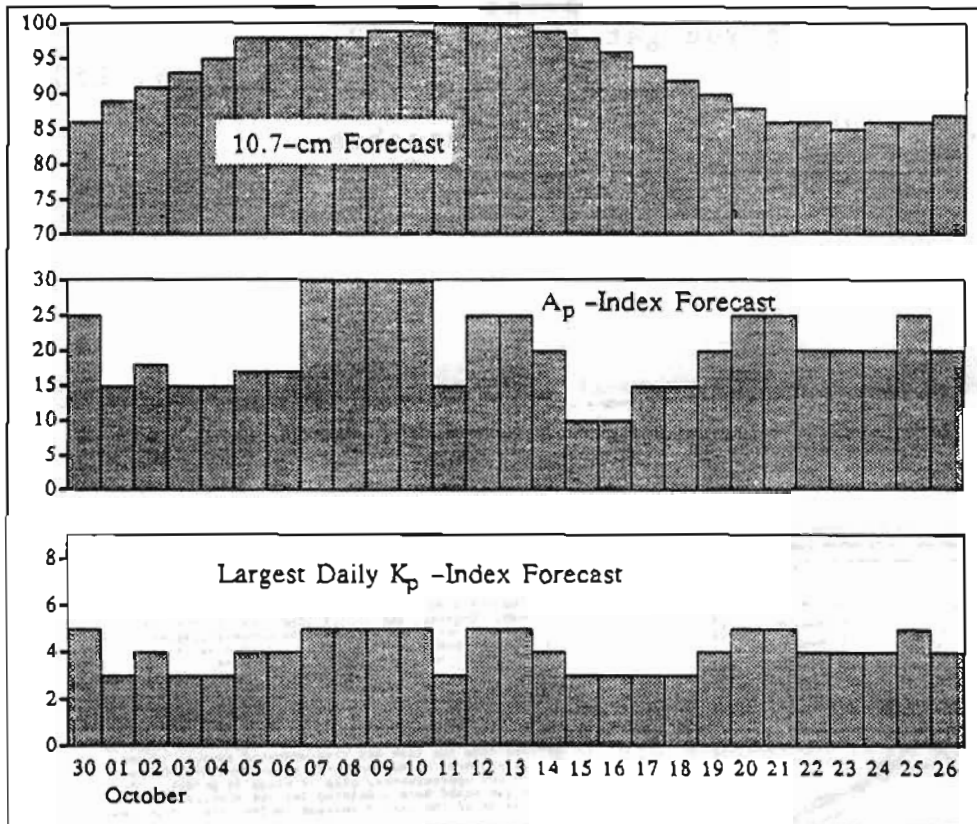
The Spectrum (backup) repeater is currently in need of a major power supply repair. Plans are in the mill to redesign the power supply to reduce dissipation and make it more reliable. We will then go about completing the modifications to the control system that will allow remote switchover from the GE to the Spectrum without a trip to the site.

PACKET RADIO NETWORK FOR CONTESTS - (de K5TU) Last contest season we experimented with packet radio for distribution of QST's related to DX contest multipliers. As a whole, it worked pretty well. I'll be holding an informal discussion on furthering this application immediately following the October club meeting in the hospitality suite. Join in and let's see how to improve the network.

The October meeting will be held in the TDXS hospitality suite in the Hyatt Regency Hotel downtown, home of the 1987 HHC Houston convention. The serious topic for the night is officer nominations. Give this some thought and discuss it with other members before the meeting. On the lighter side, the program will be a lively one. There will be previews of some of the next day's Forum events, plus an activity you won't want to miss. (Hint: it went over big in Dayton.) The theme for the night is participation, so don't leave yourself out! Afterward, the suite will be in full swing, with friends and visitors from all over.

You won't have to register for the convention just to attend the meeting (no excuse there). The entrance to garage parking is off Louisiana St. The room number has not yet been assigned by the hotel, so look for signs leading you to the suite. Hope to see you all there!

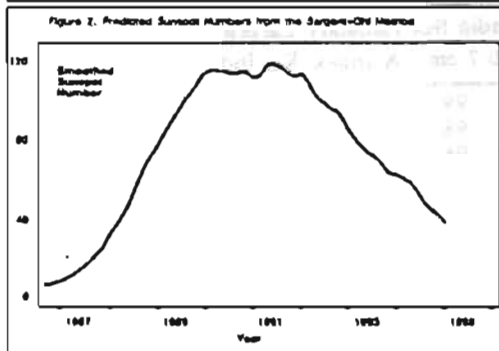
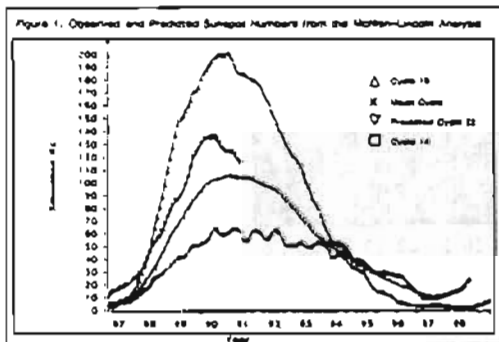
Twenty-seven Day Indices Forecast

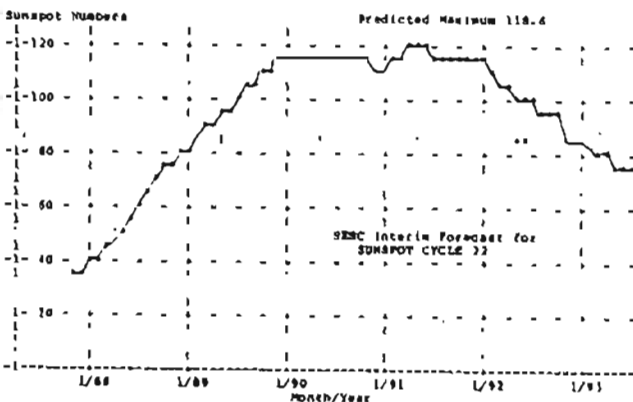


SSSC Interim Sunspot Cycle Forecast for Cycle 22 - dated 1/10/87

Disclaimer
 There are no clearly superior methods of predicting the size of sunspot cycles years before maximum. However, the method used here has done as well as any other method. The numbers graphed and tabulated here should be regarded as general guidance, and not as exact predictions.

The predictions are based on the assumption that sunspot minimum occurred in September 1986. The prediction of maximum value of Sunspot Cycle 22 is based on the Ohl method (as modified by Sargant in 1978). The profile is derived from the last six even-numbered sunspot cycles. In the vicinity of maximum, the 95 percent confidence limits are approximately plus or minus 40 points. The technique would have predicted (as did predict) the maximum value of the last 4 sunspot cycles within 1 percent.

The values charted and tabulated are predicted smoothed monthly mean sunspot numbers for the designated months.

CQ WW -- THE BIG ONE

CQ Magazine's Worldwide DX Contest has long been regarded as the DX championship contest. The phone weekend, October 24-25 UTC, usually sees the best worldwide participation of any contest year-round. Similarly, the CW weekend (after Thanksgiving Thursday) is often the best attended code event, worldwide. More rare countries pop up, more DXpeditions are mounted, more time is spent on the air than in any other contest.

Why is the WW so well attended? One reason is that popularity feeds popularity. The desire to go all out is greatest when everyone else is going all out, too. Another reason is the timing. Summer conditions are ending as fall begins. QRN drops, the low band openings lengthen, ten meters comes alive again. People are itching to get back into the fray and the WW contest is the first to really fit the bill. Another good reason is the format. The world works the world, except for your own country. Round the clock there is somebody, somewhere you can work. Lots going on, and lots of people out there to work. It all adds up to a lot of fun for both the casual op and the hard-boiled type.

What does this mean for a TDXS member in the first year of a new sunspot cycle? It means the first opportunity to stretch his legs again after the long summer doldrums. It means the best weekends for catching new countries, new ones on the low bands, learning more about propagation. It means an opportunity to help the guys in the club who are going multi-operator by lending a hand at the station, or by helping with the multiplier network on the repeater. In short, it means a good time to save up some weekend hours for operating the radio.

Now, a personal plea from the multi-ops to the guys at home: Get on the air--whatever bands you like--find/work DX and put it out on 2M. If we have a packet network and you can do it that way, great. If not, use the repeater. You may ask, why bother to tell us about a "garden variety" station, such as a VP2 on 15? Because we may not have worked it: Often, at the end of a contest we look back and see that the VP2 or LU or HBO that we worked on three or four bands was missed on 15 or 20 or some other band where they would be duck soup if we had only found them. Since the difference between winning and losing in the big multi-op battles is sometimes just a few multipliers, just a few successful helps from 2M could put your buddies over the top. Even if we don't need it, one of the deserving might need it for 5BDXCC or WAZ. So do it--put it out on the air. The more DX we put on the repeater, the better off we all are.

CONTEST CORNER
(de NT5D)

Well its October and several things come to mind: The Houston Ham-Com, CQ WW Phone, and Sprint Logs are due. The September CW and Phone Sprints were a complete success. Rumor has it that the Texas DX Society may have won first place in the Club Competition CW. Also, we had a full team for phone with excellent scores, so I am very optimistic about the Club's standing in that mode.

The Houston Ham-Com is just around the corner and we should have an excellent Contesting and DX Forum put together by Joe Staples, W5ASP.

The increasing number of sunspots should make this year's CQ WW Phone Contest the best it has been in years - save last year's contest when I worked JA's Long Path on 10 meters. There are plans to operate multi-multi at NR5M, so please contact Dave, K5GN If you are available to work the contest. In addition there is usually a group out at K5RVK, so give Joe W5ASP a call to see what their plans are.

Yours truly along with Dave WB5N and Brian KN5X will be operating multi-single from Grenada. Word from the Radio Club down there is that they have stopped issuing calls unless you plan to live on the Island. So listen for one of our calls portable J3 unless we are able to negotiate a call sign.
